PRESIDENT'S (SECOND) REPORT

A bustling time, these past 3 months. Of h0 scheduled hikes, only h didn't go on typhoon days of trees swaying and crashing, or arctic days of snow up to a coyote's eyebrows, days when the parties assembled at the Park and Ride and voted no. (Indomitability is all well and good but sometimes to persevere is simply silly, even if a heroic poem was written about the Light Brigade.) Attendance has been as high as 48 but mostly

9-20, fewer midweek.

Membership grew by 50 percent -- our member families now comprise more than 600 individuals. In addition we're pleased to be accompanied by large numbers of non-members who learn of the trips through our original and continuing co-sponsor, Issaquah Parks and Recreation Department, or other parks departments, or newspaper listings or Signpost, or the groups (Sierra Club, Friends of the Earth, Washington Environmental Council, Washington Wilderness Coalition,) that are publicizing the Alps and the others (Seattle Audubon, Naturalists of The Mountaineers) that are joint-scheduling trips with us. By the end of our first full year we'll have introduced perhaps 1000 walkers to the Alps on club hikes. Through the ripple effect, who knows how many more?
Obviously, then, we'll keep on hiking. What else?

Bicycle rides, by golly! Rosemarie Spence is organizing an exciting program to lead the way to our Bikeway Future. When your boots are tired, try wheels.

Bob Court is organizing a committee to study the country to determine the good horse

routes (and the trails horses should avoid).

Did somebody say, "Issaquah Alps Marathon"? Like, perhaps, a figure-8 around Squak and Cougar? Tim O'Brian is hot to run, wants company. Call him.

Really big news: Bill Longwell is nearly done with his map-trail guide to Tiger Mountain. And Marv Pistrang of the U. S. Geological Survey is preparing a map-guide to geology of the Alrs. Inventories of flora and fauna are underway. Finally, bumperstickers are in production, blazoning for all on the highways to marvel at, "Issaquah Alps."

These productions will be priced at just enough to be self-supporting, with a modest profit to the club treasury. For start-up funds, however, we are deeply grateful to a generous and timely grant from Recreational Equipment Inc. ("The Co-op").

But we have sober civic duties as well. The map (herin) of our proposal for a park and trail system centered on Cougar Mountain has been presented to the Newcastle Citizens Committee, engaged in preparing the King County plan for future development of Cougar and environs. The committee soon will hold a public hearing. Attend and speaks Later the committee plan will be submitted to the King County Council. Talk then and now in person or by phone or letter to your County Councilperson.

Another citizens committee has commenced another community plan, for Tahoma-Raven Heights, including half of Squak and all of Tiger. The IATC will have proposals there too. However, to help refine them we need a new study group -- a Forest Practices Committee -- to discuss a subject that even few foresters know much about -- the technique of multiple-use tree-farming in urban-suburban forests. If interested, call me (SH 6-1017).

We also need (call me) a Valley Floor-Floodplain Committee to study the farms and horse ranches and skyports being processed into shopping centers and business parks. May Valley, Issaquah Creek, Tibbetts Creek, and the Lake Sammamish plain are as quintessential to the "Issaquah Alps personality" as Cougar and Squak and Tiger. We love our cliffs and waterfalls and forests and coyotes. But we also dote on our green pastures and our cows and pigs and sheep and goats and chickens.

The suit is not against tree-farming, only against the way DNR goes about it. Other values than cash flow must be given status, especially on such near-urban forest lands as

those of Tiger.
