As I type these words the pussywillows have been put for weeks, alder and hazelnut catkins are longer by the day, coltsfoot buds are pushing up, nettles are several inches tall. Indian Plum is coming to full bloom, and in every black-mucky bottom the skunk cabbage is bursting into flame. Once more the yearly miracle (and never mind those snowflakes floating by my window, here on Cougar Mountain). And soon, the first birthday of IATC. How many of you remember May 5, the Day of Three Lightning Storms? There's other and less pleasant thunder in our club life now. But first, some happy thoughts.

Membership continues to grow at such a rate that, if maintained, by the year 2023 everybody in the world will belong. Our original (and faithfully continuing) co-sponsor of trips, Issaquah Parks and Recreation Department, having set the example, the Parks Departments of Bellevue, Renton, Mercer Island, and Seattle now are co-sponsoring, supporting, or publicizing our trips. The major outdoor and conservation groups are working with The news media are emphasizing that all our trips are open to the public.

We're running four hikes every week, some weeks more, newly including flower and wildlife walks, our first overnight backpack, and the Young Family Specials. We've found and scheduled exciting new trails.

Bicycle rides have only just begun but are expected to thrive when the tempests abate. There's more than fun to the rides -- under leadership of Rosemarie Spence, club members are planning a bikeway system for the Alps and environs. Come ride. Come plan. Come to the committee meeting April 9.

Led by Bob Court, the Horse Routes Committee (glso seeking recruits) similarly is developing an inventory of places horses can travel without being endangered or harassed by machines and without damaging trails too fragile for heavy feet. Again, the goal is to assure horses a permanent place in the scheme of things Alpine. Call Bob.

A hiker-bicycle-horse trail system in the Issaquah Alps can only be attained with support of citizens throughout King County (and parts of Pierce and Snohomish). Therefore, to acquaint public officials with the area, we're inviting them to join us on a walk to Lake Tradition, Many Creek Valley, and West Tiger 3. Elected officials and administrators. Councils. Park departments. Legislature. Leaders of other organisations. Newspapers and television and radio.

We need your help. Personally invite your representatives in city, county, state government. Attend and serve as assistant leader, native guide, ranger-naturalist, interpreter, spear-carrier in the mob scenes.

COUGAR MOUNTAIN: NEWCASTLE COMMUNITIES PLAN

The Newcastle Citizens Committee soon will present its Draft Plan for (1) review by local governments, and (2) public comment. This means you. There will be public meetings, announced in the press. The IATC will comment. But the Committee wants to hear from you, too. Attend. Speak up.

In addition, the Committee will accept written comments from citizens. Get ready to write your letter.

You are the experts on the trails of the Issaquah Alps. Share your knowledge. (See the maps in the last issue of Alpiner, and in this one.)

TIGER BY THE TAIL

In sadness rather than anger, I must report that our relationship with the state Department of Natural Resources, (DNR), which as recently as last October seemed to us open and cordial, has deteriorated. Though we still hope for a change of heart on the part of DNR, it appears we will share the experience of other citizen groups around the state, that we must consider this agency of government not our servant, but our adversary.

We requested an environmental impact statement (EIS) for the Newcastle Timber Sale on Cougar Mountain. We were told that if we didn't like the sale, we could sue. Fortunately we didn't have to -- King County did so instead. DNR withdrew the sale, temporarily,

Then came word of an impending sale in Many Creek Valley -- the Stinger Timber Sale, as a DNR wit dubbed it, well knowing who was going to yelp, and why. To be clearcut --121 acres. To be gouged for new roads -- 95 acres. Miles of new road -- nearly 12, not counting cat roads. Slope angle -- over 40%. Tributaries of Issaquah Creek to be logged with no streambank protection -- three. Trails to be impacted -- Many Creek Valley Trail (logged off), West Tiger Railroad Grade (just 200 feet from the clearcut), Section Line Trail (also near the clearcut). Newly added to the reals of the four-wheeler and motorcyclist -- all the valley north of Poo Poo Point, all the way to West Tiger.

At this writing I don't know what we're going to do about Stinger. The Issaquah City Council has requested an EIS. The IATC will, at the least, appeal to the Forest Practices Appeals Board. Beyond that -- well.....

We wish to stress a fundamental fact: The IATC supports tree-farming on Tiger Mountain, does not oppose timber harvesting there.

However, we believe the largest urban forest in the Northwest, located on the edge of the largest urban area in the Northwest , cannot be managed in the standard ways perhaps proper to forests in the boondocks. Urban forests have many important "yields" besides timber. They provide easily accessible trail recreation, clean water, clean air, peace and quiet, wildlife habitat, green relief, wilderness-hike experiences with small outlays of time, energy and money, cheap psychotherapy. Management of urban forests must be multiple-use, must preserve stream and major trail corridors, water quality, air quality,

There are methods of forest management that can simultaneously produce timber and other good things. They should be substituted for the techniques DNR insists on using on Tiger. (Because they are the only techniques the agency knows?)

We want DNR to discuss the matter through the forum provided by preparation of an EIS for Stinger Timber Sale. To date, their attitude is that Tiger is none of our business. Enough. Before sadness yields to anger. I want to conclude by once more asking your help in the "Plaintiff Trees" suit filed against DNR by Washington Environmental Council, Seattle Audubon Society, and others -- and supported by IATC. Our battles against Newcastle and Stinger and the like are holding action. The decisive confrontation for us and the entire State of Washington is this "environmental lawsuit of the decade". Please give, until it hurts -- hurts an arrogant bureaucracy, that is.

GUIDE TO TRAILS OF TIGER MOUNTAIN, by Bill Longwell, is expected off the press in late April, perhaps early May. Price? Unknown as yet -- but cheap. The text is supplemented by a contour map showing all the routes.

How do you get a copy? We don't quite know yet. Many hike leaders will have it for sale, so ask about it at the Park & Ride assemblies. If you haven't run down a copy by early May, call any Board member or come to a Board meeting. We'll probably figure some way to sell by mail.

By June we hope to have a second guidebook covering Cougar and Squak and environs.

LEGENDS OF THE ALPS

One fine morning in the spring of 1979 a very large group of hikers set forth from Sunset and Front. On the way down Second Avenue and up the service road to the powerline the party strung out. When the leader and rearguard assembled them preparatory to going in the forest, they found several hikers missing. And nevermore were they seen again...

Yet there are those who say that on dark nights when the clouds are blowing swift an low over rooftops and wise citizens are snug in their houses, a person abroad in the glo may glimpse, hurrying along sidestreets, to and fro, this way and that, the Phantom Hiker of Issaouah.....

Early in 1980 an IATC hike party climbed West Tiger 3 from High Point, then elected to loop back via Many Creek Valley and the Tradition Lake powerlines. While the rest of the group lingered at the Many Creeks, one hiker went on ahead, alone. No concern was felt because he is so wily in the wilds that were he to be parachuted, blindfolded, at night, into the heart of the Olympic Mountains, he'd instantly know where he was and how to get to civilization.

But he'd never been on Tiger before. Or in Issaquah.

Down the Hobart Road, and at Sycamore, and around the high school, and along 2nd and 3rd and 1st, and Front and Creek Way, folks stillers shaking their heads at the memor of a grizzled backwoodsman, wearing boots and parka and rucksack, and carrying an ice ax, knocking on doors and asking, "WHICH WAY IS HIGH POINT?"

At last escaping the dreaded Issaquah Triangle and attaining the freeway, he found access barred by a fence. Boehm's Candy Store was his salvation. There, a friend of the Alps directed him to Sunset Way -- and to sustain him on his journey, provided a large chunk of delicious candy.

This wilderness veteran and famous author (four books and many articles) now leads hikes for IATC. Watch for his special tour of Issaquah streets.

On a non-club trip, a hiker traversing Many Creek Valley on the West Tiger Railroad failed to spot the turnoff down to Issaquah High School and spent much of the winter
night inventing a new route straight down Poo Poo Creek to the Hobart Road. Only reqently
arrived in the Northwest, he met and became intimately acquainted with a plant new to him
-- devil's club. Having no idea where he was, he set about knocking on doors for directions. But many doors, having been opened wide enough for residents to see this refugee
from thorns and black muck, were slammed instantly shut.

At length he found Issaguah High School and now is a hike leader for the IATC.

On April 22, 1979, a party of 60 people set out from downtown Issaquah. Among them were representatives of the governments of Issaquah, Bellevue, Seattle, Mercer Island, Renton, King County, the State of Washington, and the U.S. of A. The aim was to acquaint them with the Issaquah Alps and make them aware of the area's regional significance.


